Towards our overall vision of a world where communities have the power to use the courts on their own terms to secure racial, social, and economic justice, Systemic Justice's mission is to radically transform how the law works for communities fighting for racial, social, and economic justice. This mission is undertaken via three tracks of work:

1. Building the knowledge and power of organisations and movements fighting for justice and equality.

2. Launching and sustaining community-driven strategic litigation.

3. Scaling impact by promoting equitable working models with the broader field of litigators.

How does the organisation generate income or revenue?

Systemic Justice relies on funding and donations to do its work. In 2022, we received funding from the European AI and Society Fund, Foundation for International Law for the Environment, Freedom Fund, Lankelly Chase, Porticus, Stichting Democratie en Media, Avast Foundation, Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust, Luminate, Open Society Foundations, Robert Bosch Stiftung, as well as a few smaller donations from private individuals and other support in the form of pro bono legal services and other in-kind donations.

As a non-profit, we do not seek to generate a surplus, and we do not hold any significant capital. Systemic Justice set in 2022 a reserve target of 3 months of operating expenses, considering a reserve to be a key means to mitigate risk in the event that the organisation was forced to close down its operations. Such an operational reserve would serve to ensure we can meet our obligations towards the team and creditors. Given the start-up nature of the organisation's first year in existence, we have yet to commit any considerable amounts of funds to this reserve.

Due to the start-up nature of the organisation, team members are initially paid as consultants with a transition to payroll and a salary scheme scheduled for Q4 of 2023 when sufficient stable and long-term funding is expected to be in place.

Systemic Justice received in 2022 its income from three sources: 1) the majority ouf our funds come from philanthropic foundations who provide us with grants; 2) we have received a couple of small donations from private individuals; 3) in-kind donations and pro bono legal services, which include the donation of the use of an event venue, assistance provided free of charge for our communications, and legal services which support both our projects and our organisational development. Our expenses broadly speaking fall in two categories: project costs and operational costs which include team fees. Project costs included in 2022 costs for our comprehensive, Europe-wide mapping of the priorities of racial, social, and economic justice organisations; a legal landscape mapping; and our community of practice with other litigators and legal professionals. Operational costs cover our external communication costs, fees for our team, IT and office-related expenses, travel, administration, financial expenses as well as governance and organisational development expenses.
